- **subject II (day 2):** mutual recognition and judicial cooperation between national authorities
- **subject III (day 3):** approximation of criminal laws
- **subject III (day 4):** actors of the EU criminal area, particularly Europol, Eurojust, OLAF and the EPPO.
- **subject IV (day 5):** police cooperation and data protection.
